## Let's Talk Hydroxyurea: A Treatment Choice for Sickle Cell Disease

Is hydroxyurea (HU) a cure? While HU is not a cure, it is a medication that can decrease many of the complications of sickle cell disease (SCD). It is taken by mouth once a day and comes in liquid or capsule forms. It is also known by the brand names of Hydrea or Droxia.


Does it work? Studies have shown that HU:

- Decreases the frequency of painful crises
- Decreases acute chest syndrome
- Decreases the need for blood transfusions
- Decreases hospitalizations

**How?** One of the ways that HU works is by increasing the amount of fetal hemoglobin and thereby decreasing the amount of sickle hemoglobin in the blood. Higher hemoglobin levels improve the shape and function of the red blood cells. Many of the complications in SCD are caused by blocked blood vessels. HU helps the red blood cells to travel more easily through your body.

#### Other possible benefits of HU include:

- Increased energy and quality of life
- Increased appetite and weight gain
- Decreased jaundice (yellow coloring of the eyes)
- Improved growth through childhood.



Will taking HU work right away? It usually takes several months to see the effects. The medication must be taken everyday for it to work well. If you have a pain crisis while taking HU, it does not mean that it is not working.

Does HU work for everyone? Not all people experience all of the benefits and some, although, rare, experience no benefits. Doctors feel that at least some of these treatment failures occur because the medication is not taken as directed. HU must be taken everyday at the right dose in order to work well.

Is HU safe? HU has been used for over 30 years to treat sickle cell disease and even longer for other conditions. Many clinical trials have proven that it is safe and effective. Most patients experience very few or no complications. Possible side effects are a decreased white blood cell count (WBC). WBCs are important for fighting infections. Your doctor will need to test and monitor your WBC periodically to adjust your dosage if necessary. Please talk with your doctor to learn if hydroxyurea (HU) would be of benefit to you. You can also find out more about HU at some of the community programs on our calendar.

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
