A Sickle Cellabration Heard Around The World!

Here's what others around the world have done or plan to do on World Sickle Cell Disease Day: In Nigeria, the Coalition of Sickle Cell NGOs (nongovernment organizations) is organizing a charity walk with the theme "SCD: Walk for Hope." The walk will bring together people to advocate for the recognition of SCD as a major public health problem in Nigeria, where 1 in 4 people has sickle cell trait and more than 150,000 babies with SCD are born annually.

The Sickle Cell Disease Association of Canada is taking action by setting up blood drives throughout the country. Potential donors can go online to register.

Last year on World Sickle Cell Day in Guyana, citizens were urged to petition their Members of Parliament to introduce and pass the Sickle Cell Treatment Act, which calls for routine sickle cell screening of all newborns within one week of birth.

In 2016, the African and Caribbean Women's Association (ACWA) in Glasgow, Scotland held an awareness event featuring guest speakers. Scotland had 210 patients with sickle cell in 2015, up from 58 in 2005.

In London, students from the Palmer Catholic Academy held an awareness day where children and staff paid £1 to come to school without being required to wear their uniforms. Sickle cell disease affects 14,500 people in England. In 2015, The Saudi Arabia Ministry of Health organized a series of workshops, lectures and awareness campaigns on the treatment of sickle cell disease at primary health care centers and shopping malls. In 2015, ministry officials reported that 145,750 people in the country had sickle cell disease.

On World Sickle Cell Disease Day in 2015, Jamaica's Minister of Health was a featured speaker at an awareness event. He announced that by 2018 his goal was for all pregnant women and newborns to be screened for sickle cell, for treatment guidelines to be completed and published, and for 90 percent of healthcare workers to be trained in the management of sickle cell disease.

In 2015, medical personnel from the Aga Khan, Moi Teaching and Referral and Homabay County hospitals in Nairobi, Kenya offered free screening, consultation and treatment. According to the University of Nairobi Health Services, SCD affects about two per cent of newborns in western Kenya and parts of the coastal region. About 60 to 80 per cent of those children die before their fifth birthday.

What are you doing to commemorate World Sickle Cell Disease Day? When you raise your voice, it can make a difference. Let the world hear you!
