
On Wednesday September 26th at the SCDAA convention I will give a lecture on "Opportunities and the Importance of Community

### September is Sickle Cell Awareness Month!

#### What Is Sickle Cell Disease?

Sickle cell disease is an inherited blood disorder affecting the red blood cells. People with sickle cell disease have red blood cells that become hard and pointed instead of soft and round. Sickle cells can cause blocked blood flow, anemia. and pain episodes, resulting in lung tissue damage, strokes and damage to most internal organs. Damage to the spleen makes sickle cell patients, especially children, easily overwhelmed by bacterial infections, resulting in hospitalization.

Who Is Affected by Sickle Cell Disease? While it primarily affects persons of African descent, it is also present in Caucasians, mostly of Mediterranean descent and Hispanics. Sickle cell disease also appears in Middle Eastern countries and Asia. It is estimated that over 80,000 people have sickle cell disease in the United States and over 4,000 people live with sickle cell disease in New Jersey.

How Does A Person Get Sickle Cell Disease? The gene that causes sickle cell disease is called hemoglobin (Hb) S. If a person inherits one HbS gene from one parent and one HbS gene from the other parent, they will have two abnormal hemoglobin genes, in this case HbSS. This is referred to as sickle cell anemia, sickle cell disease SS, or HbSS. If the person gets an HbS gene from one parent and a gene for a different abnormal hemoglobin from the other parent, he or she would have another form of sickle cell disease. There are many different types of sickle cell disease, but HbSS is the most common in the United States

Is There A Cure? There is hope for a universal cure through the bone marrow transplant which has been successful with a few patients, including our teen spokesperson. Bone marrow transplants are not yet widely available.

What is Sickle Cell Trait? Sickle Cell Trait means that you carry the gene for sickle cell disease that can be passed on to your children, if your partner also has sickle cell trait or the trait from another hemoglobin disorder. A person gets sickle cell trait the same way they inherit the color of their eyes or hair ... through the genes that their mother and father pass on to them. Sickle cell trait is not an illness. People with sickle cell trait are generally healthy. Sickle Cell trait can never turn into Sickle Cell Disease.

What Should a Person with Sickle Cell Trait Do? In planning a family it is wise to ask your partner to be tested in order to understand what the possibilities are for your baby to have sickle cell disease. Teens and adults should be tested to see if they carry the gene for sickle cell disease.



# SCANJ Supports the Work of Student Researchers on Sickle Cell Disease and Related Factors.

To improve the quality of life for individuals living with sickle cell disease it's imperative that we encourage and support research on sickle cell disease. High School student and SCANJ volunteer, Taylor Wilson, created an excellent Power Point presentation on sickle cell disease that was shared with her fellow students at Montclair High School. We felt it was of such great quality that we are pleased to use it as part of our outreach at Health Fairs and other appropriate venues.

Doctoral student, Sejal Patel has a dissertation study entitled "Factors Related to the Sexual Behaviors of Adolescents with Sickle Cell Disease." The objective is to understand similarities and differences in risky sexual behaviors among adolescents and young adults with and without sickle cell disease. Prior research has indicated that risky behaviors may be higher than expected among youth with chronic illness in southern and more rural locations. This is a pilot study investigating whether these patterns may also exist in the Philadelphia/ New Jersey region and whether this is an area in which additional research and clinical focus could positively impact the psychosocial care of youth with sickle cell disease. The study uses a survey-based, 2-group design (n = 29 for "sickle cell" and n = 29 for "nonsickle-cell"). All individuals ages 13 to 21 recruited from events associated with SCANJ and SCDAA/Philadelphia Delaware Valley are eligible to participate and will constitute the majority of the "sickle cell" group. Individuals recruited from Delaware Valley Charter School and La Salle University will comprise the majority of the "non-sickle-cell" group. ALL participants will receive the same survey and, in order to participate, ALL participants under age 18 must have parental consent.
